Messages from Dalena & Kelsey

Each term we undertake emergency drills. We do Fire and Earthquake drills every term and each holiday period and in the middle of the year we do a lockdown / tornado drill.

During the fire drill, tamariki immediately exit the building and line up outside for roll call.



For earthquake drills, tamariki drop cover and hold when instructed, before listening for their names in the roll call. For Lockdown or Tornado drills, we need tamariki to come inside quickly. We take these drills very seriously to ensure tamariki know exactly what to do in case of an emergency. It is also a great opportunity for our older children to show leadership by demonstrating what to do.
